Purpose of Meeting

As you may recall, during the Annual Meeting, our membership passed a Bylaw change raising the maximum age of our Intermediate members from 29 to 34. Since then, the Executive Committee has developed and approved a new intermediate dues schedule.

BYC DEI WALKING TOUR



The BYC DEI committee sponsored the Bristol and Slave Trade Talk and Walking Tour hosted by Linden Place Museum educators, on Saturday, November 2nd at 10:00am. 20 BYC members attended this tour of Linden Place and downtown Bristol. The tour included the history of Linden Place, Bristol's DeWolf and Colt families and their multi-generational journey from the dark days of the slave trade through the boom times of the Industrial Age. Since 1810, Linden Place's owners have faced reversals of fortune, praise and scandal, disgrace and redemption. Beyond being the seafarers responsible for Bristol's initial prosperity and later financial decline, they ended up capturing some of the country's most dynamic industries.



Our tour guide was incredibly knowledgeable and shared fascinating stories and historical information. The BYC members were mesmerized by the beauty of LindenPlace and its history. The BYC DEI committee hopes to offer this tour again in the spring.

The fleet is buttoned up for the winter, and EBSF is busy preparing for next season, examining our course offerings and comparing rates with other sailing schools in the Bay. Junior Sailing registration will open in early January 2025, first to BYC members and returning EBSF students, then to the public. Adult sailing registration will open February 1st.

EBSF conducted two surveys this fall: one to measure customer satisfaction for youth and adult sailing instruction; the other to gather information from BYC member women to gauge their interest in getting out more on the water.

Both youth and adult sailing class attendees gave high marks for EBSF's courses this year and offered some suggestions we will use to improve student experience.

The Women's survey revealed their interest in having sailing lessons taught by women. They are interested in other activities with a social component, too. They have formed a Women's Sailing Group with three co-chairs: Linda Cunningham, Nancy Clarke and Abby Cook, who led their first meeting November 12th at BYC. Next meeting is Tuesday Jan 28, 2025. EBSF stands ready to support this new group with our boats and instructors. In response to this new demand, EBSF will add women's beginner and intermediate courses on Monday evenings to adult sailing offerings this summer.

Acquisitions: This winter we plan to replace our old instructional 420s with good used ones we hope to find at universities that are updating their fleets. We are also looking for a good, used 17' Boston Whaler with outboard and trailer. We could also work with a good used hull that we can repower. We decided to standardize on 17' boats; our 13' boats are proving ineffective in heavy weather in the harbor. If you hear of one, please let us know.

Skunk Works: EBSF has a grant from 11th Hour Racing to upgrade the design of our experimental PowerCat, the coach boat that runs on electric power. Chris Bjerregaard leads that project and plans to improve the efficiency and maneuverability of PowerCat by adding foils and other items, and is asking for some help with some wood and composite work, installing foils, installing outboard controls and display, rewiring the trailer—some basic maintenance, some new stuff. Next season we plan to offer scholarships to youngsters from Bristol and Warren in addition to the ones to kids from the East Providence Boys and Girls Club. This December 3rd is Giving Tuesday. Your donations will help us expand our reach to kids in our local community. Thank you for your generosity this year. All of us at EBSF wish you and your families the happiest of holidays.

Moving forward with the sale of this property would require an agreement with the Barrington YC and approval of our membership. We have a meeting with Barrington to discuss this further. Watch for updates as discussions progress in the Mainsheet and a planned Spring Meeting.

Zephyrus

Have you ever wondered how a particular boat acquired its name?



Peter Canzone asks this question each month to a BYC member and provides the answer in this column.

Zephyrus is a 35ft Catalina owned by Mary Ann and Rob Rosenlof Why the name Zephyrus ???

Zephyrus is a 2003 Catalina 350 owned by Rob & Mary Ann Rosenlof. This is their second boat named Zephyrus, the first being a Catalina 36 that they owned from about 2002 to 2008. In Greek mythology, Zephyrus is the god of the west wind, which seemed appropriate for a sailboat name, and was also meaningful in that it was the first name of Rob's maternal grandfather (although with a different spelling). Rob's grandfather worked on Greek merchant ships in his younger days before emigrating to the US, where he married, raised a family, and enjoyed boating and fishing on Long Island Sound.
