

BYC 2024 PHRF RACING SEASON REVIEW



2024 turned out to be a terrific racing season for the Wednesday night Millard Series. 51 boats signed up to race in 6 Classes in a season of ideal racing conditions; no races were cancelled due to the weather. This year's participation was well balanced; each class having 8 - 11 boats registered. There were 11 new boats in the series, which is indicative of how healthy this program is. We averaged 36 boats on course for the season, hitting a high of 41 on course twice. Additionally, 41 boats raced at least 7 races to qualify for season trophy consideration, and 9 boats raced all 12 scheduled races.

A BYC tradition, the **Commodore's Cup Race** was open to all BYC members and encouraged adult and junior students to participate by crewing in the various boats during the Fourth of July week. 22 boats participated with the following trophy winners

In late July BYC hosted the **MOHOSA** races which included racers from our neighbors in Tiverton YC and Spar Island Racing Association. A total of 38 total boats signed for two days of racing in 4 classes; including 21 boats from Bristol that captured 13 of the 23 trophies awarded. (Yes, some boats received trophies for both days.)

In early September the Narragansett Bay Yachting Association (NBYA) sponsored their Fall Regatta combined with the Yacht Club Challenge. **The Yacht Club Challenge** is a team race for both Spinnaker and Non-spinnaker boats. As the previous year's winner of the Spinnaker Class, Bristol YC hosted the event. Once again, Bristol prevailed, this time in both divisions against Barrington YC and East Greenwich YC. Our Spinnaker team consisted of *Incognito, Mischief, and Hope*, while our non-spinnaker entries were *Audacious, Phase III and Horizon*.

It would not have been such a successful racing season without the wonderful efforts of 21 Race Committee volunteers who supported all of the above races and more throughout the season. They were lead on the water by Pat Small who ran most of the Millard races as the Principal Race Officer, and by Kathy Toohey and Joe Jablonowski who did most of the coordination efforts to make sure the Committee boats were always manned for each race.



EBSF NEWS

By the time you read this, fall instructional sailing on Monday and Wednesday afternoons and Saturdays will be over, completing EBSF's 2024 program. EBSF had a great season: 124 juniors and 59 adults received instruction, supported



by 67 BYC Volunteers; 23 adults sailing instructors and 44 who helped maintain, launch and haul our fleet. Thanks to you all who came out to help, including our EBSF committee members who manage the gazillion tasks of running the program. We couldn't do it without all of you.

In addition we had the great good luck to find Program Director Emily Augello, who kept everything on track and under control. You'll be glad to know that she has promised to return next season.

Glance at the parking lot and you'll see the fleet neatly stored and ready for winter weather. We have transitioned into maintenance mode, taking sails and covers to be mended and boats and rigs to be fixed. The generous response to the September fundraiser has made it possible for us to tackle a backlog of deferred maintenance, rehabbing some Mercuries, replacing a coach boat, and purchasing reduced-area sails so youngsters can sail safely in Bristol Harbor breezes. This winter, we hope to find six good used 420s to replace the ones we use for instruction, which are worn out from a dozen years of use and are years older.

It has become more difficult for all instructional sailing programs to find experienced, qualified instructors and providing housing is becoming a standard feature of employment. If you would consider hosting a young instructor for 8-10 weeks next summer, and would like to know more, please let us know.

This year we learned that women sailors are the fastest growing segment of the sport, just as we received the grant from Truancy-Simmons Outreach Fund to support getting more women out on the water. In September we held a meeting attended by about 20 BYC women and learned of their diverse interests: to learn to sail, to race, to sail the family cruising boat, a desire for instruction from women and just getting out together to have a good time. We learned about WOWLIS: Women on the Water on Long Island Sound, an organization of 400 women from 15 LIS yacht clubs who get together for social events, education, regattas, to share resources and have a good time on the water. We offered a survey on the interests of BYC women attached to October's Mainsheet and again to a Weekly Update. We hope you were able to respond. If any of these ideas or activities interest you, please plan to attend the next meeting on Tuesday, November 12 at 7 pm, when we'll have a chance to socialize, share the results, and continue to develop these ideas.
